ACK TO BACCHANALIA: Incoming Playhouse Theatre artis-tic managing director Max Reimer got a lesson in hit production Wednesday. That was at the Hotel Van-Wednesday. That was at the Hotel Vancouver, where four-time chair Nancy Burke fronted the Bacchanalia gala-auction that will fund a chunk of Reimer's repertoire. More than ever, too, since the event reportedly raised \$559,000 — \$105,000 above 2007's running.

Auctioneer Barry Scott needed snowshoes to wade through a blizzard of money as every bottle, case or dolly-load of donated wine sold above its stated value.
